Liesbeth van de Grift, Associate Professor History of International Relations at Utrecht University, specializes in the history of political representation in Europe. She leads a research project on the role of societal actors, such as consumer groups and environmental organisations, in the history of European integration. She is one of the authors of the textbook on European integration history *The Unfinished History of European Integration* (Amsterdam University Press, 2018) written for bachelor's and master's students.

10:30 **Visit to the European Parliamentarium – Experience the role play game for schools**

The Role-Play Game is designed for groups of secondary school students aged from 14 to 18+ and takes place at the Parliamentarium in Brussels.

Divided into imaginary political groups, participants will become Members of the European Parliament and learn to negotiate between themselves to build the future they want. Players must work together and make difficult decisions as they tackle issues such as water scarcity and the implications of technological advances.

The Role-Play Game aims to show how EU legislation is created, from consulting interest groups and forming alliances to negotiating with other institutions and speaking to the media.

14:15 **Who do you think you are – Identity**

Workshop and Feedback session moderated by Laurence Bragard

How do you define your identity? And what might such characteristics be? Identity constantly shifts and evolves, and therefore our views about who we are and who others are open to change. This theme examines the multidimensional nature of identity and draws on past and present examples, getting us to ponder on what European identity might mean in the 21st century.

Based on the suggested activities, teachers will reflect on what is the meaning of European identity in the 21st century.

The main questions addressed in this workshop are:

- How do you define your identity?
- What characterises your identity?

16:00 (Optional) Restless Youth: Growing up in Europe, 1945 to now

Visit to the temporary exhibition of the House of European History

In the past 70 years, young people in Europe have gone from being a group to whom history happened, to a group that actually makes history. This exhibition looks at four generations of such young people who came of age at key moments in the European story: the late 1940s, the 1960s, the 1980s and the 2000s. It explores the key experiences of youth; from education and employment, to forging an identity and finding love.

This guided visit will allow teachers to discover the interests of a European Restless youth from 70 years onwards.

Laurence Bragard curated the development of the educational components of the exhibition, including the interactive areas, the learning zones, the family trail and the school workshop. During the tour, she will address all the different educational aspects of the exhibition.
